Through our efforts, we will effect a permanent improvement in the capacities of individuals and groups to deal effectively with their own problems so they may become independent.



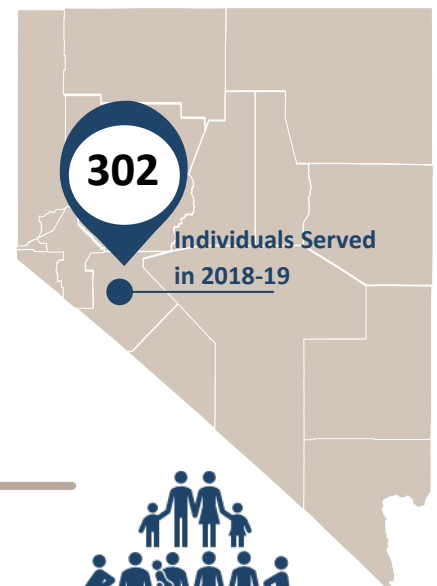

CAHS | PROGRAMS AND COMMUNITY IMPACT

In FY2018-19, CAHS received \$12,074 in State FRC funding to provide referrals, case management/family support services, application assistance, and community engagement. Direct services were provided to 302 unduplicated individuals, for a State investment of \$39.98 per individual served.



CAHS engages in fundraising efforts to supplement their State allocation and better serve the community. **For every dollar received from the State, they have leveraged \$25 in other funding to comprise their total annual operating budget of \$315,000.** Other services offered by CAHS include Emergency Assistance, Food Commodities in Mineral and Northern Nye Counties, and Infant and Child Development classes.

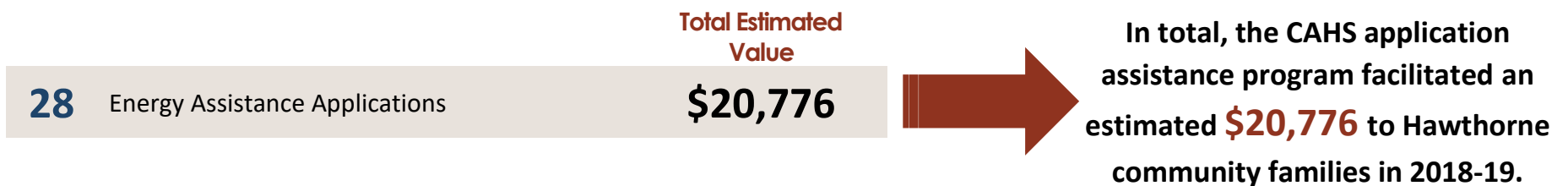
FACILITATING CONNECTIONS

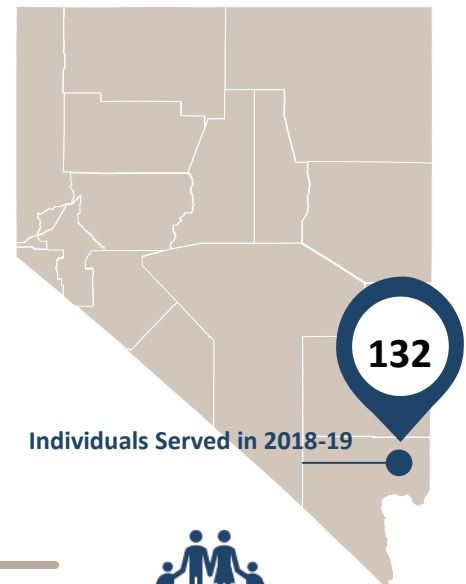

Cappelappa FRC engages in fundraising efforts to supplement their State allocation and better serve the community. **For every dollar received from the State, they have leveraged \$9 in other funding to comprise their total annual operating budget of \$133,032.** Other services offered by Cappelappa include operating a Thrift Store with proceeds supporting the Family Resource Center, as well as a Senior Food Program.
