


2023's GOAL:

Identify Barriers & Pain Points to implementing Jail Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

CONDUCTED RESEARCH VIA SITE VISITS TO ALL 23 NEVADA JAILS CONCENTRATING ON JAIL MEDICATION OPIOID USE DISORDER (OUD) PROGRAMS OR MEDICATED ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT)



2023 Research Phase - 23 Nevada Jails Surveyed





The Research

- Survey of questions specific to OUD and Jail Operations
 - 3 Sections:
 - Deflection / Diversion Initiatives / Jail Information (8 questions)
 - OUD Screening / Monitoring Information (9 questions)
 - OUD Challenges / Discharge Plan / Community Resource Information (12 questions)

Battle Mountain Key Takeaways of 23 jails surveyed: LANDER EUREKA Eureka 87% (20) departments don't have community PINE deflection options Fallon More education needed 20 74% (17) don't have diversion alternatives Ely 78% (18) are reactive & reliant on EMS most of the time Yerington Only 1 jail is using a Telehealth option 65% (15) don't screen specifically for OUD at intakè Hawthorne 91% (21) don't have a formal MAT Program NYE 65% don't have access to MAT Medications jail does not have access to Narcan Tonopah Only 1 site (Douglas) indicated they have Community Health Workers (CHW) Pioche I believe there is a statewide lack of understanding about CHW's and requires more education One jail indicated a reluctance to allow for FDA approved methadone in their jail Goldfield LINCOLN


Battle Key Takeaways of Mountain departments Lovelock 409 surveyed: LANDER EUREKA Eureka **Top three (3) barriers to implementing** PINE **MAT Program** Fallon 20 Lack of onsite medical & mental health resources Ely 39° **Lack of funding** Yerington Lack of community resources 87% don't have Multi-Disciplinary Teams to case manage those most at risk Hawthorne 65% don't incorporate discharge NYE planning to include the Forensic MINERAL Assessment Services Triage Team (FASTT) Tonopah 38° 70% don't offer Medicaid enrollment Pioche 22 out of 23 jails willing to work with state on developing MOUD Model Goldfield LINCOLN

What will success look like? Phase 1: 2024 Program Implementation

Nevada Jail MOUD Program

- Leadership / Staff MOUD Buy-In & Education
- Access to MAT Medications
- MOU with OTP Provider(s)
- HIPPA Compliant EHR & Enhanced Intake Screen
- Ability to capture data and ability to interface with Medicaid
- Ability to share medical records with service providers
- Improved jail policy where needed
- Jail MOUD Program consent/compliance
- Enhanced "at risk" monitoring
- Jail / Judicial MDT Engagement
- Patient commitment to Scheduled Service Provider Engagement
- Case Management Information System
- 3/6/9/12 Month Outcome Reporting
- Measure retention in telemedicine care / medication adherence

Community Continuation of Care

- Discharge Planning / Reentry Bridge to Community / Regional OTP Service Provider(s)
- Engagement from Social Services Case Management Team / Peer Support / CHWs
- Community MOUD/MDT Engagement
- 3/6/9/12 Month Outcome Reporting
- Transportation plan for community access to care needs
